## Landscaping in Avalon

January was the first month of our contract obligations agreed to with Avalon and CPM our newly hired landscaping company, yes they have been on site since mid November, filling in for the company that decided to not serve out their contract and in that time CPM discovered that approximately 40% of our irrigation system was not functioning, they have diligently worked on righting that wrong. We are now operating at 100% efficiency assuring us a greener spring and summer here in the community.

Remember that the valves, and the two control panels are not to be tampered with, the system once balanced and left to it own will function accordingly, If you as a resident override it for what you feel is a need to water your space, you have then thrown the system out of sync and the folks down line will be without water for that period until a tech is called out to reboot the system.

There are a few things that need remembering when purchasing new plants and shrubs that you intend to plant in the earth, first and foremost, if your planting in the front yard or backyard you need to submit a ARC form and have it reviewed for placement, zone recognition, watering needs and type of tree, plant or shrub that's taking the place of the same removed. And lastly, if you're putting in stones or gravel around your plantings it is mandatory that you use a border to prevent rocks from becoming missiles damaging people's windows and cars when yard maintenance is being performed by CPM staff.

It's planting season for herbs and vegetables for your backyard gardens. It's a wonderful hobby that I enjoy. I suggest that you use raised garden boxes, easily obtained from Amazon, our growing season in zone 10b and 11a is nearly all year long. Review this information on Google and enjoy the rewards.I"m always available to help new gardeners with projects here in the community and will continue to write a column to help us all become better stewards of the many opportunities we have at hand.

Did you know that Delray Beach was once considered the Winter Polo Capital? In the 1950s, polo was one of the most important sports in Delray Beach. Thousands flocked to the Gulf Stream Polo Fields to watch the weekly matches. Some even traveled by yacht to watch from the Intracoastal. The Duke and Duchess of Windsor frequented Gulf Stream, alongside movie stars, heiresses, and local Floridians. Players, like Stewart Iglehart, became central figures in the Delray Beach community. There were three fields with stables for over 150 horses and cottages for players.







Next stop: Japan

From neon-lit cities to rural villages to serene, natural landscapes, Japan never disappoints. The country dazzles with its natural beauty, rich history, and distinctive cuisine.

On our first full day in Tokyo, we met a local guide and embarked on a tour of Japan's bustling capital. Strolling through the colorful Harajuku neighborhood, we saw where Tokyo's history and present-day pop culture intertwine. This area is a vivid blend of fashion trends, rainbow-hued food and offbeat style.



We then explored Tokyo's old town, including the ancient Asakusa Kannon Buddhist Temple, the city's oldest, most colorful and sacred temple. It is perhaps the most famous and photographed temple in Tokyo, a city considered to be the capital of both temples and shrines in Japan.

After a short break for lunch, we perused a vibrant variety of handmade crafts and local fare at the centuries-old Nakamise Shopping Arcade. We all purchased some traditional souvenirs, tasty snacks and yummy sweets. We then returned to the hotel to rest before a special dinner that evening. We were going to try and craft our own authentic Japanese meal!

An experienced chef at a local restaurant invited the group to participate in a cooking lesson. Wearing our aprons, we watched as the chef demonstrated how to make traditional Japanese cuisine: sushi rolls, sesame spinach salad, and a chicken teriyaki bento box. What a treat!

All aboard! Stepping aboard a local train in Tokyo the following morning my group and I traveled to the seaside city

of Kamakura, where we explored the countryside, temples, and shrines on a guided walking tour. The highlight of the day was a visit to the city's famous Great Buddha. Then we sat down for lunch and enjoyed free time to explore the arts and crafts for sale along Komachi Shopping Street before transferring back to Tokyo by train.



The next day we left
Tokyo continuing to the Mount
Fuji Region. We first stopped in
Hakone, a resort town in the
wakudani Valley. A photo stop at Mount Fuji,
which stands an imposing 12,388 feet high,
was amazing! We were lucky enough to be able to
take in panoramic views of nearby lakes and villages
from the midway-point observatory. Dinner that night was
followed by free time to relax in the hotel's hot springs.

After exploring the town of Hakone on our own the next morning, we boarded the famous high-speed bullet train to Kyoto, the city that served as the capital of Japan for more

than 1,000 years. Two main attractions of this city include the 17th-century Nijo Castle, which has a unique alarm system: floors that sound like a nightingale when walked on and the glittering Golden Pavilion, the



retirement villa of the shogun Ashikaga Yoshimitsu. Inside the Pavilion, the group tapped into our unconscious mind during a guided Zen meditation session. Very relaxing!

A tea master, demonstrating the steps and customs of a traditional tea ceremony, joined us the next afternoon. He explained the function of the various utensils involved and the meaning of the symbolic gestures made as we sipped Matcha. Included in the ceremony were wa-

# DID YOU KNOW? DELRAY BEACH...\*



Briny Breezes, c. 1953. Located on A1A just north of Delray Beach, Briny Breezes began as a farm for turkey, cattle, and strawberries in 1920 by Ward Beecher Miller. During the 1930s, Miller rented his land to "tin can tourists" in travel trailers for \$3 per week. People were allowed to fish and camp for free if they bought Miller's milk and strawberries.


The park became even more popular after World War II as Delray's population and tourism industry boomed. In 1958, residents pooled their resources to purchase the Millers' land for \$1.5 million. They reportedly held a mortgage burning party when the note was paid off. Briny Breezes officially incorporated in 1963 as a town, corporation, and mobile home community.



#### **Meet Madam Jeanne Louise Calment**



Meet Madam Jeanne Louise Calment, who had the longest confirmed human lifespan: 122 years, 164 days. Apparently, fate strongly approved of the way she lived her life. She was born in Arles, France, on February 21, 1875. The Eiffel Tower was built when she was 14 years old. It was at this time she met Vincent van Gogh. "He was dirty, badly dressed, and dis-

agreeable," she recalled in an interview given in 1988.

When she was 85, she took up fencing, and still rode her bike when she reached 100. At the age of 114, she starred in a film about her life, at age 115 she had an operation on her hip, and at age 117 she gave up smoking, having started at the age of 21 in 1896. She didn't give it up for health reasons; her reason was that she didn't like having to ask someone to help her light a cigarette once she was nearly blind.

In 1965, Jeanne was 90 years old and had no heirs. She signed a deal to sell her apartment to a 47-year-old lawyer called André-François Raffray. He agreed to pay her a monthly sum of 2,500 francs on the condition he would inherit her apartment after she died. However, Raffray not only ended up paying Jeanne for 30 years, but then died before she did at the age of 77. His widow was legally obliged to continue paying Madam Calment until the end of her days.

Jeanne retained sharp mental faculties. When she was

asked on her 120th birthday what kind of future she expected to have. Her reply, "A very short one."

Here are the Rules of Life from Jeanne Louise Calment:

"I'm in love with wine."

"All babies are beautiful."

"I think I will die of laughter."

"I've been forgotten by our Good Lord."

"I've got only one wrinkle, and I'm sitting on it."

"I never wear mascara; I laugh until I cry often."

"If you can't change something, don't worry about it."

"Always keep your smile. That's how I explain my long life."

"I see badly, I hear badly, and I feel bad, but everything's fine."

"" too badiy, i noar badiy, and i too bad, but over filling o mio.

"I have a huge desire to live and a big appetite, especially for sweets."

"I have legs of iron, but to tell you the truth, they're starting to rust and buckle a bit."

"I took pleasure when I could. I acted clearly and morally and without regret. I'm very lucky."

"Being young is a state of mind, it doesn't depend on one's body. I'm actually still a young girl, it's just that I haven't looked so good for the past 70 years."

At the end of one interview, the journalist said, "Madame, I hope we will meet again sometime next year." To which Jeanne replied, "Why not? You're not that old; you'll still be here!"



## Your REAL Life Expectancy Can Dramatically Affect Your Retirement Plan

While it's a topic many would like to avoid talking about, dealing with life expectancy is vitally important when mapping out your retirement plan. Any retirement plan that doesn't make certain assumptions about when clients are "expected" to pass away isn't very good.

What's the **best way to calculate** your Life Expectancy (LE)?

There are three simple ways to calculate your LE:

- 1) Use the **CDC** (Center for Disease Control) LE tables
- 2) Use the **IRS** (Internal Revenue Service) RMD (Required Minimum Distribution) LE table

Which one should be used? It seems that most people use the CDC table. This could be a *mistake*. Why? Because it is significantly different than the IRS and life insurance company's numbers. See the following chart with LE numbers for various ages.

Why should we trust the life insurance company's number? Because they have been running these numbers for over 100 years. They know how to price life insurance so they make a profit.

Generally speaking, few "trust" the IRS but since their numbers are so similar to the insurance companies' numbers, it lends credibility to the numbers.

What if you are healthy? Neither the IRS nor CDC take into account health. The insurance company numbers from

above assume you are rated "standard" for underwriting purposes. What if you are rated "preferred"?

45-year old = 90

55-year old = 91

65-year old = 92

75-year old = 94

Being healthy extended the life expectancy numbers by two years.

**What if you are married?** The joint life numbers are very interesting. Let's look at the life insurance numbers for both "standard" and "preferred" underwriting.

#### **Standard**

45-year old = 92

55-year old = 92

65-year old = 93

75-year old = 94

#### **Preferred**

45-year old = 95

55-year old = 95

65-year old = 95

75-year old = 97

#### Why do these numbers matter?

Simply stated, it's impossible to put together a safe and secure retirement plan if you are not using the right LE tables to best plan for when you are going to pass away.

If you use the CDC guidelines and you are 55-years old, you'll plan on living until age 79.

If you use the **life insurance company** numbers, you'd plan on living until **age 86**.

If you are *healthy*, and used the life insurance company numbers, you'd plan on **age 91**.

If you are married and are both healthy, you'd plan on the 2nd spouse passing away at **age 95**.

There are significant financial/retirement planning decisions that will be dramatically different if you are planning to live to age 79 vs. 86 vs. 95.
